First Week of School

DP1 students immersed themselves in school seminars that introduced them to the DP Programme. Meanwhile, the DP2 students began the next phase of their DP journey, diving straight into their academic work. September 5th, 2025, marked the official first day of school for the PYP students of Wellspring Learning Community. The day featured a wide-scale variety of activities extending to all grade levels, ranging from team building and reaction time/strength-focused activities with the PHE department to recreational activities aimed at promoting the values of global citizenship, instilling a spirit of cooperation, and consolidating the principles and values upon which WLC is based. To achieve utmost harmony and balance between fun and education, the school also provided our PYP students with in-class visits from the nurse and counselor, providing the students with some health advice and support.



In addition to that, our Middle Years Principal, Dr. Christiane Jaatour and the Dean of Students, Mr. Salman Sultan also visited the classes to welcome the new students and provide further guidance.

Students expressed the excitement of being on a new campus, specifically mentioning purchasing food from the cafeteria and having access to a variety of activities like the ping pong table, football field, and the recreational activities orchestrated by Miss Manal Mezher. WLC's feeling of familiarity and support was described as unmatched, as students were able to tour the campus and become more accustomed to it before classes officially began, allowing them to feel ready and well-inducted.



Wellspring Community Service Projects

Community Engagement for Sustainability

On Saturday, October 25, 2025 the Wellspring community including administrators, teachers, Parents' Committee members, and Student Council leaders came together for a special cause with environmental activist Mrs. Caroline Chaptini. Together, Wellspring contributed in building the world's largest green cedar tree made entirely from recycled plastic bottles, aiming to enter the Guinness Book of World Records! The team helped craft ropes from plastic bottles and counted over 12,000 bottles, all in support of sustainability and global citizenship in Amiou, Koura.



DP Peer Study Hub

The Peer-Study hub is the first DP student-led club on campus. The Peer-Study hub was set in place in order to offer academic support to students struggling in certain subjects. DP students provided daily support during second break to peers from grades 6,7, and 8 during second break. This is a good experience for both the students learning and the student-tutors as they improve and strengthen connections between grade levels and encourage support across the community.

Recycling on CCCampus

Part of nurturing global citizens is having eco-conscious community members. Through the Recycling School Project launched this year, students were involved in a sorting activity and the DP students distributed recycling bins on campus. Materials were sorted into different bins based on their compositions. The students applied the knowledge acquired in their STEM classes during the sorting process. University Visits

Mrs. Pascale Hayek Bassil, Wellspring Learning Community's University and Carrer Guidance Counselor, emphasized the importance of university presentations in guiding students through their higher education choices.

She explained that whether online or in person, these presentations hold great value for Grades 11 and 12 particularly for students who remain uncertain about their intended majors. University representatives introduce new programs, successful ventures, partnerships, and alternative academic paths that students may explore. NGO visits were also important, as they highlighted the importance of community service even during high school.

Mrs. Pascale noted that these sessions also provide an opportunity for students to ask specific questions not always available online, such as; the possibility of receiving both financial aid and scholarships, the criteria for their continuation, the profile sought by certain departments, individual case consultations, and details regarding transfer or exchange programs. While much of the information presented by universities can be found on their websites, Mrs. Pascale highlighted that direct interaction with representatives offers deeper insight into the institution's culture and helps clarify what may seem like a complex admissions process. She concluded by expressing her hope that students have enjoyed the sessions hosted by the school so far, adding that Wellspring intends to reach out to additional international universities beginning in November.



Community Engagement Fair

Hiking Trip - Diploma Programme

This was planned by Ms. Eva Mourtada, our CAS & Service-Learning Coordinator, as a creativity, activity, service experience for the students. **CAS** is a component of the core of the IB DP and it must be completed in order for students to gain the diploma.

CREATIVITY : Students visited the very first Arabic printing press in *Dar-Mar Youhanna El Khinshara* to gain insights into Lebanon's cultural legacy. The innovation and breakthrough of the printing press invoked interest in language, creativity, and history. Two students expressed that *"the experience reminded us that creativity doesn't only mean art, it's innovation and knowledge that has shaped generations"*, and *"it is interesting to know that some of these machines are still used in some areas of Lebanon today"*, demonstrating a deep engagement with the experience..

ACTIVITY : One of the key highlights of this trip for many was the challenging scenic three-hour hike along side Assi River.

Everyone's stamina was pushed to the limit as they hiked the tough paths of Baskinta. Many students who had hiked in the past mentioned that this was actually one of the most challenging trails they had been on. Nevertheless, here are some statements from students regarding the hike: *I really enjoyed how I got to leave my comfort zone and discover a new hobby, I especially enjoyed the fact that I got to get away from my electronics and enjoy nature, and the hike was a very fun experience to have with my friends.* Experiencing vigorous activities with peers built stronger bonds between them as we saw both grades aiding each other, offering water bottles, and a helping hand.

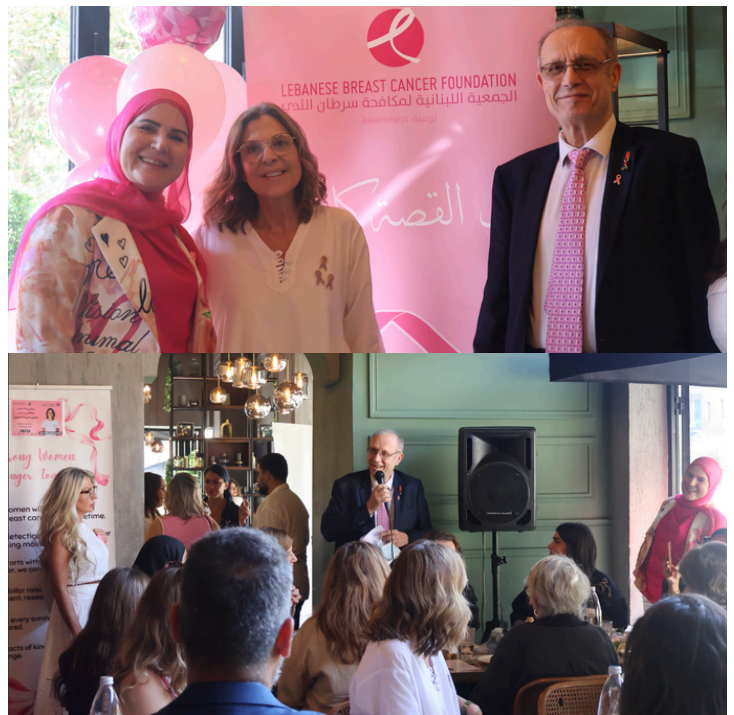
Pink Day and WPAC fund raising sale
